"No matter how hard times are,

We should always continue to teach and educate young people."

India is experiencing a devastating 2nd wave of Covid and the impact is headline news around world. India is also having a tough time economically and has an fragile health system which has great difficulty coping with the Covid pandemic.

Kings World Trust and Kings Schools have seen an income drop of 60% during the current pandemic both in the UK and more especially in India. This has been mainly due to the complex rules about the level of fees chargeable to fee paying parents of Kings Schools since March 2020.

Kings Schools and all schools in Tamil Nadu State have been physically closed since March 20th 2020, except for exam classes (GCSE & A level equivalent) who came to school for only a few weeks in February / March 2021.

All Kings classes have therefore been conducted online, on Zoom, for around 2000 students. We have had a very reduced income but have still had to pay salaries, overheads and ongoing school expenditure but without the income to sustain this expenditure. In addition, many fee-paying parents have been unable to pay fees due to job losses due to Covid. Kings has supported these families by continuing to educate their children without payment in addition to the very many 'free' bursaries which Kings gives to poor students.



The biggest threat the Kings students are facing is that their families have 'no income' during the pandemic which compels them to go to out to work or become child labourers. In this situation it will be very difficult to bring them back to class rooms once this covid war is over. Consequently, the Trust's stated aim of providing full-time high-quality education to disadvantaged children will have been in vain

Kings Schools' income and cash flow is very stretched and the result is that we don't have enough money to pay the staff salaries and bills from the month of May and beyond. Because India is paying a heavy price due to the second wave of covid and the extended lockdown, we have no idea when the school will reopen. When we reopen, we have no idea how many students will come back to the Kings School so cannot budget for the future.

Kings Schools have suffered a number of adult fatalities and serious conditions due to Covid and there is no indication of when this hardship will cease. Schools are not expecting to reopen until the autumn, at the earliest, meaning students will not have physically attended Kings schools for at least 18/20 months. A lot of catching up will be required to ensure there is no long term 'educational' damage to King's students. Government schools and many private schools in India have failed to provide any online education to students during the pandemic. At least Kings Schools' students have been provided with a comprehensive education, including daily classes, tuition, homework and exams throughout the pandemic. Including, in many cases, the provision of tablets and network so low-income students can attend online classes.

We would welcome financial help to provide gadgets and internet connection to disadvantaged students to keep them online and studying during lockdown and beyond.



SPORTS ACHIEVEMENT

National Medal in the 20th National Para Swimming Competition



Jayaselvan of Class 12, bagged a national medal in the 20th National Para Swimming Competition, held between 20 and 30 March, in Bangalore. Jayaselvan achieved his national goal by first qualifying for the state level competition which was held in Coimbatore between 14 and 16 February. Participants came from all over India and took part in the 100m freestyle event, under 56 category. Jayaselvan topped the competitions and won the silver medal.

From a Sailor to a Second Grade Officer

Charles joined his first ship as a Merchant Navy Cadet after completing his pre-sea training course at Maritime College in Mumbai. He joined sea in a sponsored cadethip programme organised by one of our child sponsors, Captain Patrick Joseph, who works for BP Shipping in London.

Charles comes from a poor labouring family. His father died at a young age and his mother initially did rolling cigarettes at home to earn a living. Charles went to a government school but later joined Kings School in its initial year 2005. He went on to be the head boy and a star in basketball and swimming.

Charles joined his first ship, a large oil tanker called MT Isis, as a Deck Cadet. So far in his career he has sailed to Singapore, Dubai, Philippines, Vietnam and Australia. He is now the second officer on a board and is en-route to USA. KWTC has set the sail to Charles bright future, who otherwise would have had a very uncertain future.



THANGAPRIYA

Thangapriya joined KWTC under the Residential Care Programme. Initially she attended a Tamil Medium School. After a year, she joined Kings School. She was a quick learner and showed great interest and enthusiasm towards academics and sports.

She was a good swimmer and went up to state level and won several medals besides taking part in other athletic events entering up to district levels on several occasions. She scored 95.8% in her SSLC Exam and enrolled herself in Maths, Biology group. She scored 87% in her Class 12 final exam. She now pursues her degree in B. Tech, Agricultural Engineering & Research through merit in a Government Engineering College, Coimbatore.





UMA MAHESHWARI

Uma Maheshwari and her two brothers lost their father when she was about nine years old. Her mother was sick and was under treatment. Uma was taken under the Residential Care Programme and attended Class 4 in a Tamil Medium School.

Later she was taken into the Outreach Programme to help her complete her schooling. She proceeded to study General Nursing in Excel College of Nursing, Vallioor, all under the help offered by KWTC. After the completion of her course, she attended a government exam and secured a job.

Now she has been appointed as a Government Staff Nurse in Manalmelkudi Government Hospital, Pudukottai.

JEBASTIN PONRAJ

Jebastin is from a financially poor family. His father is a security staff and mother is a coolie. He has two brothers and a sister. He joined KWTC under the Outreach Programme and attended Tamil Medium School. He completed his Diploma in Mechanical Engineering, with the support of KWTC. Further, he did his BBA course and attended competitive exams. Jebastin is now working in Muthoot Bank in Vallioor. He has got married to Uma Maheshwari, who has completed her B.Sc. in IT. Jebastin is grateful to KWTC for what he is today. He said, "I was lucky to be under the guidance and supervision of the Trust, which supported me all through my life, giving me good education and making me a disciplined and obedient personality."





MAHARAJA RADHA DULCY

Dulcy, our alumni joined KWTC, when she was eleven, after her father's demise. Dulcy joined Kings School and attended Class 7 in 2006. After her schooling at Kings she received her Bachelor's Degree in English Literature and English Education – all with the support of KWTC. Soon after the completion of her course, she joined Kings School, CBSE as an English teacher and has been working in the school for the past seven years. She got married this year to Mr Melwin Meriton, who works as an Assistant Manager in Huawei Technologies, Bangalore.

ARUL

Arul lost both his parents at a very young age, and was brought up by his maternal grandmother. He was taken under KWTC's Residential Programme. After schooling he pursued his bachelor's degree in Engineering in Einstein's College of Engineering, Aalangulam. He is doing his final year, and has been appointed by Gencor Pacific Automation Pvt. Ltd., Chennai through a campus interview conducted in the college.

MARISELVAN

Mariselvan, joined KWTC and started attending Kings School from Class 12. His father works as a gardener and his mother is a home-maker. After schooling he pursued his bachelor's degree in English.

While pursuing his bachelor's degree he took time to learn western dance. He is now a certified dance coach. He gives regular online and offline dance classes to children. He is excelling in his career as a dance teacher and lives a very happy and content life.



THANGAMARI

Thangamari comes from an economically poor background. She was under the Residential Care of KWTC and attended Kings School from Class 7. She completed her Class 12 with a score of 76.08% in her final exam.

Thangamari excelled in sports especially swimming. She practised swimming constantly in her school days, and has won medals and honours in district and state level swimming competitions. She has won a silver medal in All India University level. She now works as a swimming coach in Euro School, Whitefield, Bangalore. She also holds a bachelor's degree in English Literature.



SELVAPRIYA

At eight, Selvapriya lost her father to cancer. She joined KWTC and attended a Tamil Medium School in Anaikullam. Later she moved to Aloysious School, Kallikulam and completed her schooling.

She joined Nehru Nursing College, and pursued her bachelor's degree in nursing. After completing the course, she worked in Bangalore as a nursing staff for 2 years. Later she got an opportunity to work in Manipal where she worked for another 2 years. She gained a lot of experience and exposure during her time as nurse in Manipal. UNHINDERED LEARNING

As mentioned earlier Kings quickly responded to the pandemic by starting online classes to provided uninterrupted learning while ensuring the safety of the students as well.

Online classes for Kindergarten

Online classes for kindergarteners were conducted every Thursday and Friday. The classes were brief (30 mins) but effective. The classes were based on activities and were focused towards improving the cognitive abilities of the children.

The Covid-19 lockdown gave opportunities for the parents to actively take part in their children's learning process. The assigned homework brought the kids and their parents together in their journey of learning. This conducive learning environment achieved through online classes greatly amplified the learning abilities of the kindergarteners. Further the teachers sent regular video clips of various learning topics every day for the children to learn at their ease.



PHYSICAL CLASSES FOR GRADE 9-12

After a complete lockdown of school for about 9 -10 months, the school was re-opened on January for classes 10 & 12 and on February for classes 9 & 11. Though the physical classes were not like the regular ones, both the students and teachers were excited to meet each other. All the classes strictly followed the quidelines given in the SOP ensuring the safety of each individual.



PTA MEETINGS

Parents Teachers Meetings were conducted for all classes to brief the parents about the online classes and the follow ups to be done by students and parents. The meetings provided the management and parents with opportunities to express the challenges and concerns of each other and in ensuring that the students are provided with the same comprehensive education that they would receive in a regular physical classroom. The school received positive notes from most parents for starting the online classes early and keeping the children of all the classes engaged in learning and other activities.















PROGRAMMES AND CELEBRATIONS

Programmes and celebrations for Independence Day, Children's Day and Teacher's Day were conducted online and nothing stopped the students and teachers sitting at home from celebrating these special days.
